

□ Prioritize Training & Education

Seven Protective Measures Frontline Action Steps

- 1. Utilize A CPP Child Protection Policy
- 2. Screen Youth and Adults
- 3. Establish Restroom Procedures
- 4. Institute Transportation Processes
- 5. Off-Site Event Guidelines
- 6. Check-in and Checkout Process
- 7. Communicate Clearly Defined Classroom Expectations
 - Rule of Two or Two Adult Rule
 - Classroom ratios
 - Visibility guidelines
 - Discipline & physical touch

Reporting and Response What, When, & How

- □What to Report
 - Witnessed Abuse
 - Children's Abuse Disclosures
 - Consistent Signs and Indications
 - An Offenders Disclosure

Reporting and Response When a Child Discloses Then...

- Stay calm
- □ Show love and respect
- Praise their courage
- Reassure they are not to blame
- Let them speak freely, don't interrupt
- Use open-ended questions
- Don't offer false promises
- □ Protect the child immediately from the suspected offender
- Report the abuse to authorities, supervisors (church leaders)
- Document the disclosure
- □ Protect the child's right to privacy





Reporting and Response Words are Powerful - Options for Disclosure

□I believe you!

Thank you for telling me.

■You did the right thing asking for help.

□I'm sorry this happened to you. How can I help?

Take as much time as you need.

 \Box I'm here. I stand with you.

Things may never be the same, but they can get better.



Ongoing Support The Child and Family

- □Implement protective measures
- Offer **support** person(s) for the child and family
- Show up, listen, affirm and accompany
- □Immediately terminate/suspend alleged perpetrator
- **Offer** to help find qualified treatment
- □**Post** signs about child abuse prevention & reporting
- □Host a support group for survivors
- **Publicize** your policy of zero tolerance for abuse
- **Communicate** your commitment to child protection
- □ Speak often about prevention
- Be able to **answer** questions about child safety
